Bills, Taxes & Tips

Bills can be reviewed and paid in the main Hotel Office. Bills include the mandatory taxes levied by the government (1% Tourist Development Tax, and 10% Service Charge). Unlike most western hospitality levies, in Sri Lanka the 10% service charge is a legal requirement, although its distribution and timing is often anachronist.

At our Hotel, we give all staff members, regardless of seniority, the same % share of the monthly service charge, and it is paid within a week of the month's end. Any tips given are added to the Service Charge Fund and distributed evenly. By agreement, 1% of the Service Charge is retained in a Staff Welfare Fund set up to help our staff and their close family members deal with unforeseen problems.

Electricity & Gas

Ceylon Electricity Ltd.'s many supply breaks offer unrivalled opportunities to practice patience.
Occasionally, monkeys add to the fun by chewing through wires, kamikaze style. The Hotel takes its electricity from a specially built substation run off the national grid to provide for greater supply security but when the power is cut, the hotel's diesel-run generator kicks in.

Bottled gas, bought in from abroad, is (after wood) Sri Lanka's go-to cooking fuel: more reliable and cheaper than electricity.

Loos

A Powder Room lies off the main hotel courtyard and a bathroom/changing room in the Horseshoe Veranda / swimming pool.

Night Noises

Strange noises heard in the dark are usually *Porcupine, Wild Boar, Civets, Frogs* in radiant song & *Owls*. Wiji, our Nightwatchman, is available all through the night in the main hotel block to manage the unexpected.

Prayers

The village Iman's song sounds 5 times/ day: the current Iman has a rather good voice. On Poya nights

the sounds of monks singing Buddhist prayers drifts through the jungle.

Problems & Solutions

If anything, however, minor, in your room or elsewhere does not work or causes you problems please let our team know so we can put things right quickly.

Room Cleaning & Laundry

Rooms are cleaned, and beds made daily: linen and towels are changed every 2nd day of your stay. If you would like them changed sooner, or do not wish for housekeeping to come, please inform the Hotel Office.

Shopping Essentials

Essential items such as toiletries, medicine, cigarettes etc can all be obtained in our local village, Galagedera. Priyanka, our tuk-tuk driver can take you or simply fetch things; and can be booked via the Hotel Office.

Water

Feast or famine is the mantra of the water board, who are struggling to keep up with King Parakramabahu 1153 declaration: "in a country like this, not one drop of rain water should be allowed to flow into the ocean without profiting man." The Hotel's water comes from a 350 foot deep well bored through rock in the lowest part of the estate, with the water then pumped into retaining tanks at the estate's highest point, though during the dry season even this fecund source needs topping up.

Drinking water comes as bottled mineral water: to cut down on the use of plastic we use large bottles transferred into jugs for serving; but small plastic bottles of water are also available.

Wi-Fi & Telecom

Wi-Fi is the country's *go-to* subject, and like a migratory bird, its sightings provoke much excitement. Unlimited unmetered Wi-Fi, a fixed feature of the West, remains here commercial Nirvana. With its loving network or routers and underground cables, the Hotel Wi-Fi and Telcom comes courtesy of Sri Lanka Telecom and is surprisingly regular and stable.

WHERE'S WHERE

Acreage

The Hotel sits in over 25 acres of hilly land, dipping down to paddy field and up to hills of 1,000 ft. Now about 15% of its original size, the Estate was partitioned first by the 1960s land reform acts; and then by division for inheritance. *Coffee, Cocoa, Timber,* and *Coconuts* formed the commercial heart of the old estate, and this legacy goes on today.

Amphitheatre

Perfect for private performances of song and dance, the Amphitheatre is planted with terraces of *Tea*, *Lemon Grass*, and *Bougainvillea*.

Corkscrew Orchard

Soon home to the estate goats, Imelda, and Ponzi and their many Ptolemaic offspring, and planted with Mango, Rambutan, Star Fruit, Coconut, Tamarind, Guava, and other fruit trees. A pond and 2 old wells collect water naturally from the surrounding area.

Ella Valley

Stretching above the pool and into the jungle this plantation of ancient *Coconut* palms is being replanted with true *Cinnamon* and more Coconuts. In monsoon times, the Ella, or stream, becomes a rushing waterfall.

Frangipani Valley

A large wild area at the entrance of the estate, gradually being planted with true *Cinnamon*.

Inken's Coffee Coconut Hill

A hill behind the pool planted with now-wild Coffee bushes and gradually being replanted with true Cinnamon and tenderly raised baby coconuts of the original and now almost extinct variety that populate the estate.

Kandy Road Plantation

A wild hill on the edge of the estate beside the Kandy Road, much favoured by wild boar.

Kitchen Garden

Laid out behind *The Treehouse* are the kitchen gardens where herbs and vegetables are gown for our kitchens. Scattered among the beds are shade nurseries of *Orchids* and *Anthuriums* for the hotel, and propagation nurseries.

Hotel Gardens

Shaded by Frangipani Trees, yellow & pink Acacia, Flame Trees, Cloves, and Lipstick Palms croquet lawns and hedges stretch before the hotel buildings. The Orchid Walk leads off this, a shortcut to the Lower Estate Road. Huge retaining wall stones line it, planted with Tamarind and Mahogany. The path encircles a well, which collects hotel rainwater favoured by monsoon frogs. Above the hotel rises a large retaining wall planted Poinsettia, Cycad, Jak, Cook and Norfolk Island Pines, and Jacaranda.

Mudunahena Walawwa

The main hotel block, built in the 1930s by the Mayor of Kandy. It replaced an original family house that stood on higher ground in the area of the estate feted for bringing an invading Dutch army to a standstill by a downpour of rocks. When the water supply ran out, a new Walawwa was constructed on the Hotel's present site. The original stone foundations of the earlier structure can still be seen. Photographs of the 1930s Walawwa can be seen in the Hotel Office or Library dating from 2007 before the renovations began.

Nurseries & Greenhouse

A collection of Netted Structures where orchids, anthuriums, young trees, and herbs are grown; and a Greenhouse planted for the hotel kitchens.

Old Rubber Plantation

A hill stretching between the main hotel area and the front gate, planted with old *Rubber* trees.

Otto's Terraces

Several acres of almost-feral *Teak* trees provide their papery shade to part of the estate far

beneath the swimming pool. They are enclosed by an arc of several acres of adolescent rubber trees.

The Pineapple House

Built in 2018 in recherché art deco style to enlarge the hotel accommodation, replacing a set of outbuildings that collapsed in the monsoons.

Pepper Valley

Vines of *Pepper* planted up *Glericidia* poles line the main estate road from its entrance to its end.

Pineapple House Gardens

Individual gardens outside the bedrooms of The Pineapple House are planted with ornamental Ginger, Heliconia, Frangipani and other scented trees, and flowering shrubs. They stretch out onto a hill planted with Lemons, Kumquat, Grapefruit, Oranges and Lemongrass.

Roads

Three roads dissect the estate.

The main Estate Road is lined with *Flame Tree* and *Erica Palms* and kept a little overgrown to help us remain a secret.

The Road turns into the *Lower Estate Road* winding its way past the Spice & Kitchen Gardens and Spice Kitchen to head off beneath the pool and into the Jungle.

Somewhere along its way it meets up with the *Upper Estate Road*, a grass road that links back to the Estate's white entrance gates to provide a full 30 minute circular walk. At this juncture, also starts the *Jungle Walk*, a small path that takes the walker through the jungle and down the hill past small hamlets that abut the estate.

Singing Civet Hill

Rising above the hotel, and planted with ornamental flowers, ancient *Cycads, Sapu, Clove* and *Cinnamon*.

Spice Gardens

Spice is widely planted across the estate, with several acres of *Pepper* vines, rows of *Cinnamon*, *Clove* trees and a range of other plants including *Vanilla, Turmeric, Pandan* and *Ginger*. The most accessible planting can be visited in the area behind *The Treehouse*. Nutmeg, though undeniably delicious, does not grow here owning

to the instant paralysing effect it has on dogs who are tempted to chew the seeds, with fatal results.

Spice Kitchen

Built during the Covid Lockdown by Estate Staff in the traditional way with mud and bamboo walls, dung and cement floors, tin roofs. It serves as a dining area for the staff to relax in, and part of it is used by the Estate Rubber Collectors to process the estate rubber sap using rubber processing rollers manufactured by Walkers of Wolverhampton in 1942.

The Treehouse

Built in the 1930s as garages and storage rooms for the main Walawwa. Photographs of the structure can be seen in the Hotel Office dating from 2007 before the renovations began.

Wild Zones

Scattered across the estate are many wild areas, some awaiting taming, others allowed to deepen into entrenched wildlife-friendly jungle.

Butlers

- Heroth (Doc, as we call him) is not only our Head Butler but also an expert in alternative treatments and the medicinal values of plants and herbs. Herath's family home, shaded by a splendid ancient mango tree, is in Matale.
- > Lahiru has perfected his affable and highly professional skills in a wide range of hotels before joining us as the newest member of our team.
- Nandana together with being butler, also provides many fixes for electrical problems as he is also an electrician. He lives a few kilometres from the Hotel with his wife and children.

Birds

> Sri Lanka has recorded almost 500 bird species. Over 200 of them breed here, 33 endemic. The Hotel is a marvellous place to bird watch, especially at the start and end of the day. We have seen Buzzards, Kites, Ospreys, Shikras, Harriers, Eagles, Falcons, Quail, Peacocks, Pigeons, Doves, Paraquets, Malkohas, Koels, Owls, Crows, Hornbills, Kingfishers, Bee-Eaters, Barbets, Swifts, Woodpeckers, Flame-Backs, Skylarks, Wagtails, Pipits, Swallows, Woodshrike, Bulbuls, Oriels, Robins, Pittas, Babblers, Warblers, Flycatchers, Fantails, Tits, Nuthatches, Sunbirds, Flowerpeckers, Drongos, and Mynas across the plantations.

Chess

Chathuranga our Head Chef is widely experienced in all areas from fusion to Western, Asian to bakery, twinning his passion for food with a deep understanding of the island's food culture. He has worked in some of the country's finest hotels including the Cinnamon Grand and the Heritage Kandalama – and led part of the widely respected Perera & Sons cafes, pastry-bakers to the nation.

- Kasun From boy to man, Kasun has worked with us - crop attendant, houseboy and then, retraining, as a chef. As well as preparing beautiful dishes with dazzling speed, he also knows pretty much how everything works in the hotel and helps ensure most challenges are managed into submission.
- Sudesh has worked in a range of fine hotels in Sri Lanka before coming to us. It is a bit invidious to highlight one specially area, given his all-round excellence, but his pastries and breads are seriously more-ish. He commutes (with very carefully curated music playing in his car) from his home in Kandy, where he lives with his wife and son.
- Akash has just joined as our new Trainee Chef from St Anthony's College; ovens full of bread, cakes and pastries are his go-to happy places.

Gardeners

- Ananda heads the Gardening team; he is also an expert mason - and a dab hand at flower arranging, responsible for all the plants in the Hotel.
- Gunepala has worked on the estate for over 12 years and lives with in one of the hamlets that border it with his family and Billy the Kid, the lively if not notorious male goat responsible for our Goat Hareem whose care is one of Gunapala's chief responsibilities.
- Janaka is the backbone of the gardening team, keeping lawns swept, path weeded, and the plants in the kitchen garden and spice garden rotating just like the organic compost bins he oversees.

Harem

Situated in the Corkscrew Orchard beneath the Hotel's Parking Area is the Goat Harem, where our all-female goats live their decorative and Glericidia-munching lives. Male goats were once part of the family, but the reproductive excesses of *Billy the Kid* proved too much, and now the only males allowed in the pen are non-Goats.

Housekeepers

- Chintha has worked on the estate for over a decade, first tending crops, now tending rooms. If you are feeling blue, her giggles and smiles will transform your day; and should you take the longer Jungle Walk from the Hotel, you will pass right by her home.
- Nadeeka is Chinta's partner in perfection, moving, like her, from estate work to housekeeping – but equally adept at raising baby goats, vegetables and all other manor of things that have a habit of suddenly become urgent.
- Shyamalee juggles a life as wife (to Manju) and mother with brilliant housekeeping & cooking staff meals in the Spice Kitchen, which doubles up as an after-school centre for her young sons.

Insects

11,144 species of insects inhabit the island, through only a fraction has been counted here, which is refreshing free of the most irritating ones: mosquitos and flies. Mayflies live their blinkand-you-miss-it lives for a few monsoon days; microscopically small bees, butterflies and moths abound. Four species of Asian Jumping Spiders have been discovered, but sadly not hopping around here.

Lichen

Barometers of just how good air quality is, the tender hearted lichen that spread in glorious greys and oranges across trees are a big feature in Sri Lanka with nearly 1000 species recorded. Happiest of all, they flourish on our trees.

Mammals

Few countries of comparable size offer so diverse a range of mammals as Sri Lanka. Its wildernesses support 126 species, 19 endemic. The estate's last working elephant died here in the early 1970s, having earlier stood (with terminal consequences) on his ill-tempered mahout. The Ceylon Ash, under which the estate elephants were kept, still stands in the Spice Gardens. Five waring families of Toque Macaque Monkeys live here, their bite being much worse than their bark. Giant Squirrel abound, along with Lesser Squirrels, Bandicoots, Gerbils, Mice, Hares, Shrews, , Bats, Fishing Cats, Civet, Wild Boar, Mongooses, Muntjac, and Deer. Porcupines can be heard munching through newly planted shrubs at night.

Managers

- Angelo Perera The Hotel's all-rounder General Manager is that of rarest professionals, for he had to help build the hotel before he could then run it. Experienced, unflappable, wise, and funny, there is little if anything that defeats his problemsolving capabilities. Celebrities, politicians, royalty: Angelo has mixed with them all in his professional life, just as perfectly as he mixes cocktails.
- Sajith Jayathilake Our Finance Manager keeps the office and hotel finances running smoothly, a herculean task given the despondent lethargy of the banking sector. He lives in Kandy, from where he commutes to the hotel on a speedy scooter
- Manju Shantha The Hotel's Mr Fix-It is a master of all trades. Few problems eludes him. For many years our main tuk-tuk driver, he is now at the heart of the hotel ensuring that its many unseen essentials, from electrically to gas, plumbing to painting, housekeeping to laundry, work efficiently. He lives with his wife and family just a few kilometres away and when things get especially busy helps the butler team too.
- Thushara De Mel Our Assistant Manager, deputies for Angelo in all areas and brings a careful eye to bear on all the things that make the hotel the lovely place it is – skills he honed over many years, in Sri Lanka and the Middle East. He commutes to work from nearly Katugastota.

Nightwatchman

Wiji has worked on the estate for over a decade, first as a crop worker; and now as our mindful, ever-helpful Nightwatchman; a role a combines with putting the hotel to bed when are sleeping; and waking it up, long before anyone else is awake. In between time, he helps with all manner of things, from dish watching to grass cutting.

Reptiles

of Sri Lanka's 208 species of reptiles, 116 are endemic. Amongst them are *Crocodiles, Lizards* and *Monitors* and *Turtles*, the increasingly rare *Star Tortoise*; and, of course, as in any tropical country, snakes (only 5 of which are venomous, requiring a trip to the hospital and a dose of antivenom). Lemon grass and Mother-in-law's Tongue, plants much disliked by snakes, are planted all across the built areas of the estate to deter them. Stylish little *Skinks* and colour changing *Chameleons* can be found everywhere, along with the odd *Monitor Lizard*, and melancholy clucking *Geckos*, whose great service is to vigorously munch their way through all manner of insect pests.

Ten Special Trees

- Ceylon Ironwood ("Palu"). A dense slow growing hardwood occasionally used by very patient carpenters for cabinet making; and grown widely across southern Asia.
- Ebony. Black, hard, snail-slow, fussy, and so rare and expensive it is sold in kilograms, Ebony resembles a difficult, distant, dazzling relative crashing the family Christmas. Once widespread, it is now so rare that its felling is illegal unless under special permit. Several medium ebony trees grow on the estate and some much pampered baby ones.
- Presidents usually enjoy, with permits aplenty required should you wish to chop one down. Its wood makes excellent furniture. Jak is one of the few trees that can be cropped almost like a yew. They abound across the estate, huge green fruits growing out of the stem and thicker branches. A superfood in its own right, it is as loved by our monkeys as by our chefs, its naturally sweet, subtle pineapple- or banana-like flavouring used to make a variety of dishes, including custards, cakes, crisps, and curries. It also makes a perfect meat alternative with a taste like pulled pork.
- Mahogany. One of the great hardwoods of the world, and prized for its beauty, durability, and colour. Introduced to Sri Lanka from South America, there are many specimens growing wild across the estate.
- Mango. Mango pushes aside all other fruits to take the gold. Unmissable dark green leaves betray the many specimens growing across the estate. There are several hundred mango cultivars, the best tasting being the Alphonse and Jaffna's Karthakolomban. Put them to the test against some of the most widely available varieties here:
 - Ampalavi a large mid-level fruit.
 - Betti Amba –found in Matara.
 - Banganapalli large, yellow and a good all-rounder
 - Dampara commonly found from Colombo.
 - Kohu Amba the wild mango, fibrous but a great taste.
 - Malwana –found near Gampaha.
 - Neelam an especially heady scent.
 - Pol Amba –found in Kurunegala, and Kuliyapitiya.
 - Sour Mango good for pickles.
 - Willard small, bright red and yellow; wickedly sweet.
- Mara. Commonly found along roads to provide the sort of shade extreme introverts favour, Mara

- is called the "rain tree" for the way its leaves fold during rainy days, allowing rain to fall through the tree. Whilst not widely used in carpentry, it makes enough appearances to keep its hat in the ring.
- Nandu. With a hard yellowish brown wood, and satiny lustre the nandu was much used for fine cabinetwork - but it is now very rare.
- Sapu. White-stemmed Sapu, sometimes known as the Joy Perfume Tree for its fragrant flowers, can be found growing across the estate; its textured, dark olive-coloured timber prized for cabinetry.
- Satinwood. A small and now very rare tree, Ceylon Satinwood's decorative timber made it perfect for furniture, panelling, cabinet work, flooring, carvings, toys, musical instruments, and luxury goods.
- Teak. Fast growing, able to reach heights of 50 metres and with huge papery leaves, teak is widely used in furniture making. There are many specimens across the estate, include a feral 3 acre-plantation far beneath the pool.

The Three Directors

- Bianca was born a stone's throw from Oxford's Garsington Opera and has kept in fine operatic voice ever since. She is the Mother of the hotel's Schnauzer family; and fond of tummy tickling.
- Archibald arrived in Sri Lanka from Gloucestershire on the airport luggage turntable.
 He juggles his role as Bianca's husband with perimeter patrols of the hotel to ensure no intrusion by monkeys, wild boar, or mongoose.
- Coco is the daughter of Bianca and Archibald; a true Sri Lankan schnauzer having been born here. She is much given to ear massage. All the toys scattered around the place belong to her. Her brothers, Sky & Jupi live in style in Colombo. Like her parents, she runs, jumps, barks – but never hites

The Junior Directors

The junior directors are Mikael and David, who bought the estate back in 2007 whilst on holiday; and, in Colombo, the banker Ranjani Goonetilleke.

Ruhung 0-2,000 ft. From coastal plains to the Sinharaja Rain Forest; shielded from monsoons to make long, beautiful leaves that turn intensely black on withering for a strong, full-flavoured black tea.
